

One of the most effective tools in this process is the use of previous year question papers, which help students understand examination patterns and structure—offering them a strategic edge in preparation.

At the heart of this academic support system is the Centre for Examinations, a pivotal arm of the institution that ensures seamless coordination and execution of both internal and external assessments. University question papers, received online, are securely printed by the Centre and made available in the library for reference. This initiative has proven invaluable in helping students align their preparation with academic expectations.

Each semester features two internal assessments, for which the Centre generates question papers using departmental question banks meticulously crafted in accordance with Bloom's Taxonomy. External examinations are organized in full compliance with the university's academic calendar, employing a barcoded system to uphold transparency and integrity.

Beyond examinations, the Centre also manages the logistics of academic assessments—ranging from seating arrangements and invigilation schedules to the sorting and secure packing of answer scripts. Post-assessment, the scripts are dispatched via the postal system to designated university valuation camps.

The academic year 2024 - 2025 introduced a significant shift with the implementation of the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP). This curriculum reform not only brought a new academic structure but also required a corresponding transformation in assessment methodologies. The Centre for Examinations proactively adapted to these changes, ensuring that all new requirements were met with efficiency and professionalism.

Notably, the end-semester examinations of odd semesters (I, III, V, and VII) are now conducted at the college level, further emphasizing the Centre's role in maintaining academic rigor and administrative precision.

#### ACADEMIC LANDSCAPE

In 2024-25 approximately ₹35 lakhs was awarded, enabling deserving students to pursue their education without financial barriers. The academic year began with Vidyarambham 'Nidarshana' and continued with a series of departmental and general events, culminating in the Annual Day. The campus also celebrated a mix of cultural and national festivals, along with 35 commemorative days, fostering diversity and inclusion.

Our flagship event, Snehasangamam, alongside the Mar Antony Padiyara Lecture Series—held in honor of our founding father—was a remarkable success. The blessing of the new HM block, the grand conclusion of our silver jubilee celebrations, and the announcement of our NAAC grade, all celebrated together under the theme "Crescendo"

#### **SPORTS ACHIEVEMENT**

The Department of Physical Education at Naipunnya College actively participated in various tournaments, including Calicut University's D'zone, State, and National events. We also hosted the Inter-University National Women's Netball Championship with 48+ universities, where our students were part of the winning University of Calicut team.

The department has excelled with 14 students securing first place in national competitions, 26 representing Calicut University in All India Inter-University tournaments, and 48 first-place, 20 second-place, and 3 third-place finishes across various events. These achievements highlight the dedication of the management, skilled coaches, and the steadfast support of faculty and the local community.

The college has steadily improved its university ranking, securing seventh in the Overall Aggregate Championship and sixth in Overall Women's Performance. The 2024-25 academic year reflected our vibrant spirit, dynamic reforms, and dedication to holistic education.

#### NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

At NIMIT, the National Service Scheme (NSS) embodies compassion in action. In 2024–25, our volunteers led impactful initiatives in environmental conservation, health, education, and social welfare.

Environmental Efforts included tree planting, clean-up drives at bus stops, college entrances, and highways, as well as beautifying Moodapuzha Check Dam and cleaning Karukutty Railway Station, Gandhigram Hospital, and Naipunnya Nagar. A vegetable garden was set up at St. Mary's L.P. School, East Koratty.

Health Campaigns featured a blood donation camp with Govt. Hospital, Aluva (50 units collected), deworming drives with FHC Nalukettu, International Yoga Day sessions, and AIDS and eye donation awareness programs.

Social Outreach included Pothichoru food drives at Kripasadan and Koratty, book donations to MAMHS, a ₹1 lakh contribution to the Wayanad Rebuild Mission, and ₹5,000 to Govt. HSS Palissery. Under the Digi Keralam project, we ran digital awareness sessions and conducted skill-building workshops on paper bag making and brochure design.

Cultural & Patriotic Engagements saw volunteers participate in national festivals, conduct anti-drug awareness programs with Kerala Excise and DARE Club, and stage a powerful awareness dance.

#### STUDENT UNION

## **Annual Report 2024-2025**

With a deep sense of contentment and gratitude to the God Almighty for showering his abundant blessings upon all the department endeavors, I am happy to present the achievements and the progress the department made during the academic year 2024-25 to improve the academic offerings and students' learning experiences.

## **Department – An Overview**

The Department of Commerce has been scaling new heights since its inception. The department offers both UG and PG programs. At the undergraduate level, it offers B. Com with three specializations: Finance, Computer Applications, and Cooperation, along with BBA. At the postgraduate level, it offers M. Com with Finance specialization. as Currently, the department has 582 students enrolled in various UG programs and 15 students in the PG program. The department comprises 28 faculty members, of whom eight hold Ph.D. degrees and four have M.Phil. degrees.

## **University Results**

The department achieved excellent pass rates in the sixth-semester exams: 100% in B. Com Finance, 95% in Computer Applications, 70% in Cooperation, and 92% in BBA. M.Com results are awaited.

## **Capability Enhancement**

A Bridge Course on Accounting was conducted for 32 first-year non-commerce students. An ability test assessed first-year students in aptitude, IT, and GK, helping identify areas for improvement.

Four Add-on Courses for final-year UG students—Diploma in International Finance and Accounts, MS Excel, Capital Market, and GST with Tally—saw strong participation. For second-year students, courses in Logistics & Supply Chain Management, Event Management, Basics of Design, and Digital Marketing were offered.

The CMA professional course is ongoing for 12 students, with two completing it this year. ACCA and new courses in Logistics & Supply Chain Management and Aviation & Airport Management were also introduced. All first-year students completed a language skill development certificate course.

## **Training Programmes**

Students participated in various training programs including SEP, Meraki, Leading Hands Program, Super Sweeps, Be-Hub, and Power Talks. First-year students attended Induction and Orientation.

## Career Guidance, Internship, and Placement

Career guidance sessions, including overseas education and MBA webinars, were held for final-year students. A 30-hour training program helped with competitive exams. Fifty-two students completed internships, and placements for final-year UG and PG students were highly successful.

## Participative Learning/Interactive Learning

Alongside classroom sessions, students received practical exposure to work life through four sessions of Industry Interactions conducted by experts from various industries. A one-day workshop on share trading was also organized to assist students in understanding the stock market.

### **Club Activities**

Two important clubs function within the department: The Entrepreneurship Development Club and the Quiz Club.

The Entrepreneurship Development Club (ED Club) organized various programs under the 'Earn While Learn' initiative, with active student participation. Major activities included the Onam Chanda, Christmas Fair, and the weekly Friday Market. These events helped 228 students earn a total of Rs. 182,000/- during the academic year.

The 'Flair Com' Quiz Club motivates, inspires, and rewards students' quest for knowledge. In collaboration with "Swaraj," the Independence Day celebrations, the club conducted a quiz competition on 'Indian Independence Day Related History.' Another quiz was held in association with 'Avani,' the Onam celebration.

## **Outreach Programme**

Second-year students organized *Snehasagamam*, a day for differently-abled individuals, raising Rs. 20,000/- for the cause.

## **Research and Publication**

Final-year UG and PG students carried out project work under faculty guidance. The Research Quality Assurance Cell (RQAC) monitored the quality of research. Both faculty members and students published papers in various UGC-recognized and other journals and participated enthusiastically in national and international seminars, workshops, and paper presentations.

This year was notable for the number of paper presentations and publications. The department published the proceedings of the national conference 'Dhanpath -25' with an ISBN number and the monthly journal 'El-Commercio.'

## **International/National Conference**

The 'DHANPATH 2K25' International Conference on Sustainability, Innovation, and Social Responsibility was held in hybrid mode with 71 papers and 97 delegates.

### Resonance 2K24

Resonance 2K24,' a national-level cultural and management fest, was organized by the department, providing a platform for students from various colleges to showcase their talents. A total of 125 students participated in five events.

### **Industrial Visit**

An industrial visit in November gave 206 final-year students valuable practical exposure.

### **Book Distribution**

Textbooks were distributed at concessional rates, with a total discount of around Rs. 50,000/- and free books for financially disadvantaged students.

### **Academic and Orientation Activities**

The academic year commenced with an orientation session for newly admitted students of BSc Computer Science, BCA, and BSc IT. Ltd., who provided a comprehensive overview of industry expectations and career paths in the IT domain.

## **Skill Development Initiatives**

A hardware workshop was conducted for II semester students of BSc CS, BCA, and BSc IT, introducing them to essential hardware concepts and hands-on troubleshooting.

A four-day aptitude training program was organized for V semester students of BSc CS and BCA, covering logical reasoning, numerical aptitude, and problem-solving techniques.

- A 30-hour add-on course in Python Programming was delivered to IV semester BSc CS, BCA, and BSc IT students.

**Internships and Industry Exposure**

- A 2-week virtual internship was facilitated for V semester students of BSc CS and BCA, offering hands-on project experience.
- A similar 2-week internship was extended to III semester students of BSc CS, BCA, and BSc IT to build early exposure to professional environments.

## **Certifications and Examinations**

The department successfully coordinated the STED Council Examinations for the courses Python Programming and Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning for III semester students of BSc CS, BCA, BSc IT and V semester students of BSc CS and BCA, respectively.

These assessments helped validate students' technical competencies with industry-recognized certifications.

These successes have been made possible through the dedicated efforts of the college management, experienced coaches, faculty members, and the wholehearted support of the local community.

During the year under review, our boys and girls excelled in various sports and games. Several of our talented athletes represented Kerala State in All India tournaments:

- 15 students secured first positions in national-level competitions.
- 26 students represented the University of Calicut in the All-India Inter-University tournaments.
- 21 students secured first positions, and 4 students won second positions in All India-level tournaments.

## **Outstanding Achievements:**

Our students achieved remarkable success in various championships during 2024–2025. In the Calicut University Inter-Zone Netball Championship held at Sahrdaya College, Kodakara, both the Men's and Women's Netball Teams secured third position. At the international level, Angel Paul represented India in the Kuala Lumpur International Tug of War Club Championship (2023–2024) and secured fourth position. In the Junior National Drop Roball Championship held in Uttar Pradesh, Fahad Kabeer A K won the gold medal. In the Senior National Drop Roball Championship (Haryana), Aneesha Ismaiel, Devika Sudheer, Sheethal M P, Diya K, and Ashna Maria Jose won gold in the team event and silver in mixed doubles. At the All-India Inter-University Drop Roball Championship, Akhila Hari K V, Aneesha Ismaiel, Sheethal M P, and Devapriya P M bagged gold in the team event and silver in mixed doubles.

In netball, Aleena Jose, Vaishnavi M, and Niya Scaria secured third position at the Senior Netball National Games in Goa. At the All-India Inter-University Netball Women's Championship hosted by Naipunnya College, Anjana Lakshmi P S, Vaishnavi M, Aleena Jose, Irene Elsa John, and Ashna Maria Jose emerged champions. At the National Fast Five Netball Championship (Telangana), Akhil Antony won third position, while Archana Bineesh, Aleena Jose, and Vaishnavi M won first place. In the All-India Netball Championship 2024–2025 held in Rajasthan, Akhil Antony, Milam M. Saju, Juwel Varghese, and Abinand K. V. clinched the gold medal.

In Tug of War, at the All-India Inter-University Championship in Chennai, Devika S Nair and Angel Paul secured first position in the women's category, while Sourabh M B, Bebin Joseph, and Jestin John topped the men's event. At the National Senior Federation Cup (Arunachal Pradesh), Meetha Mamman and Angel Paul won gold in the women's championship; Angel Paul and Abhinav T Santhosh won gold in the mixed category, and Muhammad Faris, Jestin John, Sourabh M B. Bebin Joseph, and Amal Biju secured gold in the men's category. The same team also won silver in the Senior National Men's Tug of War, while Abhinav T Santhosh and Neethu Babu bagged second place in the Mixed category. In the National Championship held at Erode, Tamil Nadu, Meetha Mamman secured first place in the women's event. At the All-India Beach Tug of War Championships in Daman & Diu and Maharashtra, our teams, including Alphiya Jose, Devikrishna E S, Nikesh K Jayan, Angel Paul, Vyshnavi S, Amal Biju, Jestin John, Alent K M, Sreedevi K, and Muhammed Nashith, dominated with first positions across multiple categories.

In Korfball, Immanuel James, Roshal Babu, and Prince Thomas secured second position in the All-India Inter-University Championship held at Crescent University, Chennai, while three other players also represented the University of Calicut at the same event. At the Junior Nationals held at Amenity Public School, Rudrapur, Uttarakhand, Vishnu Dev (1st B. Com Finance), Rohan K Roy (2nd B. Com CA), Bichu B (2nd B.A. English), and Ashik Xavier Anil (2nd BCA) won the gold medal. In the 36th Senior National Korfball Championship, Immanuvel James (3rd B. Com Finance) and Joyal Mathew Jaimon (2nd BBA) represented Kerala and secured first position.

In junior championships, at the Junior Tug of War Nationals held at Chinchani Beach, Maharashtra, Harsha M S, Alfiya Jose, Prabhath Achari, Vismaya, and Malavika won the gold medal. At the 37th Senior National Tug of War Championship, Neethu Babu (2nd MBA) won gold in the Beach Women's category; Siva Sakthi, Kalai Selvi, and Sreedevi K won gold in the Beach Mixed category; Alphy Sibichan won gold in the Outdoor Women's category, and Amal Biju and Jinto Joy won bronze in the Outdoor Men's category. In the National Junior Drop Roball Championship (Varanasi), Finu Faran secured second position. A special note of pride goes to Ms. Ashna Maria Jose, a B. Com Co-operation graduate from Naipunnya Institute of Management and Information Technology, who represented India in the Hong Kong Bauhinia Cup 2025, held from June 5–8, 2025, and brought home the gold medal, marking a historic international victory for our institution.

In the All-India Netball Championship 2024–2025 held in Rajasthan, Akhil Antony, Milam M. Saju, Juwel Vergheese, and Abinand K. V. secured the gold medal. At the Junior Korfball Nationals in Rudrapur, Uttarakhand, Vishnu Dev (1st B. Com Finance), Rohan K Roy (2nd B. Com CA), Bichu B (2nd B.A. English), and Ashik Xavier Anil (2nd BCA) also won gold.

In the 36th Senior National Korfball Championship, Immanuvel James (3rd B. Com Finance, B Batch) and Joyal Mathew Jaimon (2nd BBA) represented Kerala, finishing first.

Ms. Ashna Maria Jose, a B. Com Co-operation graduate, represented India in the Hong Kong Bauhinia Cup 2025, held from June 5 to 8, and won the gold medal, bringing pride to the nation and the institution.

## **Empowering Futures at NIMIT**

The Department of Training and Development at NIMIT remains dedicated to unlocking student potential and shaping future professionals. This year, we advanced our mission through impactful programs focused on skill enhancement, career readiness, and leadership growth.

At NIMIT, we believe the foundation shapes the future. This year, 471 first-year students began their journey with Nexus, our immersive orientation program crafted to spark confidence and connection. More than just an introduction, Nexus helped students understand academic expectations, navigate exam patterns, and feel at home within the vibrant NIMIT community—laying the groundwork for a purposeful and empowered college experience.

Our flagship Skill Enrichment Program (SEP) empowered students with vital soft skills, interview techniques, and domain expertise—supported by advanced tools like "Tell Me More" and the British Council's "Learn English." 356 final year students proudly earned their SEP certificates certified by STED council

In collaboration with Confido group, we hosted Finishing Touch, the dynamic interview training session designed to prepare final-year students to confidently face recruiters and stand out in a competitive job market. At NIMIT, we don't just train students—we transform them into industry-ready professionals.

To nurture academic excellence, the Walk with Scholars (WWS) program identified 104 high-performing students using a score-based selection system. These scholars benefited from two Expert Nxt events and a Student Guru session and focused on mentorship and skill development.

Expanding learning beyond campus, the Interuniversity Student Exchange Training Program, Youth Empowerment Series (YES)offered valuable exposure to different institutions and cultures, encouraging curiosity, adaptability, and a broader worldview. Along with the School of Professional Development at DIST, Angamaly, we also partnered with Sunspire Institute, Karukutty and hosted three successful YES series, helping students explore different learning experience

At NIMIT, we believe in creating spaces where students can lead, express, and evolve. This year, Meraki and Synergia—platforms for undergraduate and postgraduate students—allowed them to showcase their professional skills through research presentations, quizzes, roleplays, news reading and more. With 23 Meraki sessions and 1 Synergia session, creativity and collaboration thrived.

Through the Leading Hands Program (LHP), 40 students received leadership training via Aarambh and Leaders Thrive, empowering them to become change-makers. Additionally, the Be-Hub initiative introduced 6 transformative habits, inspiring students to embrace personal growth and positive change.

The Earn While Learn - Giftz Spot initiative empowers students to transform their creativity into income, offering handmade cakes, chocolates, ornamental fish, and custom portraits for sale during two special campus events. This platform not only supports student entrepreneurship but also strengthens the sense of community, providing students with the opportunity to connect and showcase their talents.

In addition, the Face 2 Face event before the college union elections gives students the chance to engage directly with candidates. This year, 16 candidates vied for 12 union council posts, with particularly fierce competition for the positions of chairperson, vice-chairperson, and joint secretary, reflecting the vibrant democratic spirit on campus.

Selezione, our department's prestigious search for the Best Outgoing Student, saw 16 finalists from 60 nominees. After rigorous evaluation, Ms Elza Biju (Computer Science) was named NIMIT's Best Outgoing Student for 2024-25. This year, we successfully hosted three editions of the "Connecting the Dots" training program, each meticulously crafted to provide global participants with valuable insights and equip them with essential skills.

We proudly facilitated student participation in 24 intercollegiate management fests across Kerala and beyond, where 241 students showcased their talents, earned numerous accolades, and gained invaluable exposure—enriching their personal growth and paving the way for their future careers. We celebrated 28 Commemorative Days, promoting awareness of global issues and cultural diversity, while 14 student-led assemblies honed public speaking and organizational skills.

These initiatives underscore our department's unwavering commitment to fostering a supportive and enriching learning environment—one that empowers students with the skills, knowledge, and experiences essential for future success. ## DEPARTMENT OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

The IT Department at NIMIT plays a vital role in monitoring and maintaining all computer systems, network services and devices, software, and other IT-related functions on campus. Our primary responsibilities include maintenance services covering hardware, networking, software, and the Internet of Things.

Hardware maintenance involves assembling and installing new computer systems, printers, and other electronic devices in the computer labs, classrooms, and staff rooms across all blocks. We have also taken active steps to improve the campus network facilities by ensuring efficient network connectivity and internet access. The department has played a key role in servicing and maintaining various hardware components.

To extend our expertise beyond the campus, the department has established NITCS (Naipunnya IT Consultancy Services), which provides consultancy services to other organizations. Our services include software and website development, KOHA and Moodle implementation and training, and Google applications training, among others.

The IT Apprenticeship Programme 2023, initiated by our department, follows the "earn while you learn" concept for Naipunnya students. This year, we successfully conducted the third phase of the programme, selecting five Computer Science students as apprentices. They work with the IT team after their regular class hours and receive a monthly stipend. The department has consistently demonstrated excellence in maintaining the E-College software "Linways", which manages student information, attendance entries, marks tabulation, and more. In addition, we have developed two new software applications — SmartSupport and MentorMate.

- SmartSupport is designed for registering and monitoring IT, electrical, and plumbing-related complaints or requests to ensure efficient resolution.
- MentorMate streamlines the processing and documentation of student mentoring details.

We have also developed an admission software to collect and process new admission details, automatically generating ID cards and bus concession cards. Another achievement of the team is the successful development of the Student Feedback Software.

The department continuously supports the IQAC cell by uploading and maintaining NAAC-related documents and files.

The NOTE (Naipunnya Online Training and Examination) Centre, functioning under the IT Department, facilitates online examinations conducted by NSEIT, the IT division of the National Stock Exchange, for organizations such as the Indian Institute of Banking and Finance (IIBF), CAT, GAT, III, KEAM, FACT, and CUSAT. We also collaborate with other organizations including TCS, Avneer Business Chamber, Sify, Sai Educare, and Satvat.

As the world continues to advance rapidly in the field of Information Technology, we remain committed to updating our knowledge and skills in the latest software developments, implementing them within Naipunnya, and making technology more accessible and user-friendly for everyone.

## PLACEMENT CELL

The Placement Cell at NIMIT serves as a vital link between job-seeking students and recruiters from various professional sectors. Managed by a dedicated Placement Team led by the Placement Officer, with support from faculty members and student placement coordinators across all departments, the cell plans and executes placement activities throughout the academic year. NIMIT offers academic programs including UG in Hotel Management, UG and PG in Commerce, UG and PG in English Literature, UG and PG in Computer Science, and a PG program in MBA. Each year, over 428 students graduate, becoming employable across diverse fields.

During the academic year 2024-25, the Placement Cell conducted numerous career guidance programs and campus placement drives. A significant number of students have been shortlisted and are awaiting final interview rounds even before their final exams.

From the Department of Hotel Management, 130 final-year students underwent Industrial Exposure Training (IET), completing it by the last week of April 2025. This was followed by external viva voce examinations conducted by Calicut University, along with submission of IET and project reports. Many Hotel Management students have already received offer letters through campus placement drives held during the academic year.

Prominent recruiters who visited the campus include VIVANTA by Taj, Trident Kochi, Holiday Inn Kochi, The Residency Tower properties at Rameshwaram, Chennai, and Coimbatore, Radisson Salem, and Renai Kochi. These employers offered positions such as 'Management Trainee' and other entry-level roles.

Placement activities for other departments are progressing concurrently. The primary focus of the Placement Cell is to prepare students to secure appropriate positions that match their skills and aspirations.

The Placement Cell functions under the following parameters:

- Collecting data on eligible candidates and companies each academic year
- Maintaining and updating the placement database regularly
- Preparing a pool of students from different disciplines
- Gathering information on new companies and job openings
- Providing training and career guidance to students at regular intervals
- Collecting details about job fairs
- Conducting job fairs and campus placement drives such as TAKSHAK
- Preparing students prior to placements through soft skills and careerbased tutorials
- Coordinating with alumni groups for job opportunities and offerings
- Conducting online and offline interviews
- Providing end-to-end support throughout the placement process

## NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

The academic year 2024–2025 was marked by dedication, creativity, and impactful community engagement for NSS Unit No. 278 of Naipunnya Institute of Management and Information Technology (NIMIT), Pongam, Koratty. Textile dyeing is the second-largest source of water pollution globally. In many developing countries, untreated wastewater from factories directly into rivers and lakes. This toxic waste contaminates drinking water, kills aquatic life, and impacts the health of nearby communities, often leading to skin diseases and breathing issues.

Another major issue is the carbon footprint of the fashion industry. The entire supply chain, from growing raw materials to manufacturing, transporting, and even returning unsold clothes, produces around 10% the world's annual carbon emissions. This is more than all international flights and shipping combined. As the climate crisis worsens, the call for sustainable practices in fashion becomes urgent. Yet, there is hope and responsibility, especially for young designers, educators, and students in thi 107.



Fashion is more than just a style choice; it can reflect our values. As future professionals in the industry, we must redefine fashion to be not only beautiful but also responsible. Let's create clothing that honours both the wearer and our planet. The future of fashion depends not just on its appearance but on its impact. 

# Code & Creativity: The GTA-Inspired 24-Hour Hackathon at NIMIT

After the harsh winters came spring. Meanwhile, at NIMIT, things were starting to gain momentum. There was zeal and ambition in the air. Amidst the beautiful scenery, the minds of the IEDC team were restless—they dreamt big. The Principal, Rev. Fr. Dr. Paulachan K. J., shared that vision. With rigorous planning, we decided to organize a national-level hackathon.

The word "hackathon" refers to an event where programmers, designers, and others collaborate intensively to develop software or hardware—typically over a short timeframe. Here, "hack" means exploratory programming, not security breaches. We opted for a 24-hour challenge scheduled for February 21–22. We also held sessions on deworming, AIDS awareness, and eye donation, a mix of learning and inspiring others to care about their health.



The 7-day Special Camp we held at Government High School, Palissery from 21st to 27thDecember 2024 was truly unforgettable. It was intense, vibrant, and life-changing. We cleaned, taught digital literacy, visited old-age homes, and held cultural programs that united hearts. The early morning yoga sessions and the group discussions at night were equally valuable, building not just muscles but minds. That camp reminded me of the deeper meaning behind the NSS motto: "Not Me, But You."

Our visits to Kripasadan Old Age Home and distributing food packets as part of the Pothichoru drive were particularly emotional. We also donated books to MAMHS, Koratty, and raised funds through events like film festivals, an ice cream fiesta, and a chips sale, all to support the Wayanad Rebuild Mission. I still remember the moment we handed over ₹1 lakh to the mission and ₹5,000 to the Student Welfare Fund at Palissery, it was a proud and humbling moment.

Many of us were trained to be digital literacy trainers, a role that pushed us beyond our comfort zones. Our unit also received appreciation during the NAAC Peer Team visit, where we presented an exhibition showcasing our work. ## Fieldwork at Sahrudhaya Welfare Society: A Shared Journey of Learning and Transformation

#### Introduction

Fieldwork is often described as the soul of social work education — the place where classroom concepts evolve into lived realities. For us, being placed at Sahrudhaya Welfare Society in Ernakulam was more than just an academic requirement; it was a journey into the heart of human experience. Through our time in diverse districts like Ernakulam, Alappuzha, Thrissur, and Kottayam, we encountered people from varied walks of life — children, transgender individuals, elderly residents, persons with disabilities, caregivers, and more. Each interaction helped us not only apply social work methods but also reflect deeply on the emotional and ethical dimensions of this noble profession. With the guidance of our agency supervisor Miss Annie and the support we extended to each other as co-partners, we found ourselves growing both professionally and personally.

## Ancy Joy, MSW – My Fieldwork Diary: Compassion in Actions

My second semester fieldwork, spanning from February 7th to May 5th, was filled with raw experiences, life lessons, and emotional moments that will forever shape my perspective as a budding social worker. My agency



supervisor, Miss Annie, was a beacon of kindness and knowledge. Her patience, support, and guidance helped me grasp field realities, social work methods, and human needs with a sensitive heart. Her dedication to both professional practice and student development is something I deeply admire.

Sahrudhaya offered a unique opportunity to engage with communities across Kerala. From urban centers to quiet rural pockets, every place came with its own rhythm, its own needs. I conducted seven individual case works — one of the most powerful being with a woman who was a caregiver to her mentally challenged brother. Her life revolved around him, and while she spoke with great love, I sensed the weight of her silent exhaustion.

One of the most touching episodes for me occurred during a visit to an old-age home in Kottayam. There, Mariyamma, an elderly resident, confided, "All I need now is company and someone to talk to." Her words sparked a moment of deep reflection in me. That night, I started drafting a simple but heartfelt retirement plan for my parents — not just for financial security, but to ensure they grow old with joy, companionship, and dignity. That was the power of presence — and I realized then, perhaps for the first time, what it truly meant to connect.

During my placement, I was able to carry out seven individual caseworks, three group work interventions, and two community-level programs. I engaged in everything from guiding children to manage screen time, to organizing an Elderly Day Celebration filled with music and laughter. one of the most powerful being with a woman who was a caregiver to her mentally challenged brother. Her life revolved around him, and while she spoke with great love, I sensed the weight of her silent exhaustion, reminding me that listening itself is sometimes the most valuable form of help.

These field realities taught me the necessity of empathy, ethics, adaptability, and documentation in our practice. Most importantly, I understood that my role was not to "fix" others, but to walk beside them, helping them realize their strengths and identify possible resources. This perspective helped me develop respectful and empowering interventions.

These learnings and observations are now deeply rooted in me. They are not just lessons — they are val-

ues and principles I carry forward into my journey as a committed and compassionate social worker. But above all, they reminded me of the quiet strength that lies in simply showing up — with compassion, clarity, and commitment.



## Anu Biju, MSW – My Fieldwork Reflections: Lessons from the Field

When I began my field placement at Saharudhaya, I carried with me a sense of nervousness — unsure of what lay ahead. But as the weeks unfolded, the

agency became a mirror reflecting back my growth, strength, and purpose.

I worked on five individual caseworks during this time. One case that still lingers in my mind involved a child dealing with severe behavioral issues stemming from neglect at home. Through weekly sessions and careful observation, I helped the child express his fears through drawing and storytelling. Over time, his restlessness gave way to trust — and I watched him go from aggression to openness, slowly forming a connection with his mother too. This case taught me that children often speak in silence, and it is up to us to learn their language.

Group work was both challenging and deeply enriching. In Alappuzha, our session with school children on screen dependency post-pandemic turned into a dialogue on loneliness. Many of them missed their friends during the lockdown and now felt uncomfortable socializing in person. We introduced small role-play activities, and by the end of the session, the children were exchanging stories and playing without hesitation. It was a joy to witness healing begin through shared play.

In another group, I worked with mothers struggling with parenting stress. We spent that session talking about self-worth, balance, and ways to care for oneself without guilt. Watching these women listen to each other and offer comfort was one of the most empowering experiences of my training. Community programs added a different layer to our journey. The drug awareness session helped me understand the undercurrents of peer pressure among teens. But it was the home visits that truly grounded me. I met a young woman in Ernakulam who, despite being wheelchair-bound, had started a tailoring unit from her home. Her resilience inspired me in ways I cannot put into words.

This placement also taught me about boundaries, about when to offer help and when to step back. It gave me space to reflect on my own emotional responses — to process the sorrow, joy, anger, and hope that come with this profession. Perhaps one of the most meaningful parts of my journey was working alongside Ancy. We shared ideas, challenges, silent frustrations, and countless cups of tea. Her kindness during a personal low point in my life reminded me that support systems aren't just for clients — they're also for us.

**Both** of us walked into Saharudhaya Welfare Society as students. We now walk out with stories that shaped us, people who inspired us, and lessons that redefined our understanding of what it means to serve. Fieldwork didn't just teach us social work — it taught us to be human, in the truest sense.




होती है, बस उनकी भाषा अलग होती है।

### Tandoori Chicken Gyoza with Mint-Yogurt Foam and Beet Onions

It is an Innovative fusion non-vegetarian starter that brings together Indian spices with Japanese technique — modern, flavourful, and perfect for impressing guests or fine-dining menus:

#### Components:

- 1. Tandoori-spiced Chicken Filling
- 2. Handmade or store-bought Gyoza Wrappers
- 3. Mint-Yogurt Foam (modernist cuisine)
- 4. Pickled Onion Garnish
- 5. Ghee drizzle or charcoal oil for smokiness

#### Ingredients (Serves 4-5):

#### For the chicken filling:

- Chicken 250 g
- Ginger-garlic paste 1 tsp
- Kashmiri chili powder 1 tsp
- Garam masala ½ tsp
- Roasted cumin powder ½ tsp
- Hung curd 2 tbsp
- Lemon juice 1 tsp
- Salt to taste
- Chopped coriander 1 tbsp
- Optional: Smoked paprika or a drop of liquid smoke for tandoori flavour
- Mustard oil-50 ml
- Chat masala-10 gm
- Black salt- 1/4 tsp
- Butter 50 gm
- Chopped Green chili 2
- Chopped coriander leaves ½ tsp



#### For wrappers (or use ready gyoza skins):

- · All-purpose flour 1 cup
- Water ½ cup (warm)
- Salt a pinch

#### Mint-yogurt foam (using lecithin or ISI siphon):

- Mint leaves ½ cup
- Yogurt 100 ml
- Water 50 ml
- Salt to taste
- Soy lecithin 1.5 g OR use whipping siphon with N2O cartridge

#### **Beet onions:**

- Thinly round sliced onions 2
- Beetroot 1
- White vinegar ¼ cup
- Sugar 1 tbsp
- Salt ½ tsp

#### **Preparation Method**

#### 1. Make the Chicken Filling:

- Mix all filling ingredients in a bowl.
- Let marinate for 20–30 minutes.
- Bake chicken, 180 degree for 8 minutes
- Chop chicken and add some chopped coriander leaves, Chat masala and Chopped Green chili.
- Mix Well

#### Prepare Gyoza Wrappers (if making fresh):

- Mix flour, salt, and warm water.
- Knead into a soft dough and rest 30 minutes.
- Roll into thin circles, 3 inches wide.

#### 3. Assemble the Gyoza:

- Place 1 tsp of chicken mixture in center of each wrapper.
- Fold and pleat like traditional gyoza.
- Steam for 5-6 minutes, then pan-sear on one side until golden crisp.







#### 4. Mint-Yogurt Foam:

- · Blend mint, yogurt, and salt until smooth.
- Add soy lecithin and froth using a hand blender or charge in a whipping siphon.
- Spoon the foam just before serving.

#### 5. Beet Onion Onions:

- Mix vinegar, Beetroot juice, sugar, and salt.
- Add onions and let sit for 30 minutes.

#### Plating:

- Place 3-4 gyoza in a semi-circle.
- Dot the plate with mint-yogurt foam.
- Top each dumpling with a beet onion.
- Finish with a drizzle of charcoal ghee or mustard oil for aroma.
- Garnish with micro herbs or coriander oil.

A crunchy, golden South Indian vada meets the smoky, spiced world of Middle Eastern shawarma — reinvented as a starter bite.

#### Components:

- 1. Shawarma-spiced minced chicken vada
- 2. Crispy medu vada-style batter
- 3. Garlic tahini yogurt dip
- Lemon-pickled onions or Beet onions
- 5. Microgreens or mint for garnish

#### Ingredients (Serves 4-5):

#### For the Chicken Medu Vada Batter:

- Boneless chicken (minced) 200 g
- Urad dal (split black gram) 1 cup (soaked 4 hours)
- Ginger 1 tsp (minced)
- Green chilies 1 finely chopped
- Shawarma spice blend 1 tbsp (or mix cumin, coriander, paprika, cinnamon, garlic powder, turmeric)
- · Chopped parsley 1 tbsp
- Salt to taste
- Baking soda a pinch (optional, for fluffiness)

#### Garlic and Coriander Green Tahini Dip:

- Yogurt 3 tbsp
- Tahini paste 2 tbsp
- Garlic 2 cloves (roasted or fresh)
- · Coriander Leaf's -15 gm
- Lemon juice 1 tsp
- Salt to taste

#### For Garnish:

Thin-sliced red onions + lemon juice + sumac (or chaat masala) Mint leaves or microgreens

#### **Preparation Steps:**

#### 1. Prepare the Vada Batter:

- Grind soaked urad dal into a thick, fluffy paste.
- Mix in minced chicken, shawarma spices, green chili, ginger, herbs, and salt.
- Fold well until airy (you can use a spoon or hand in circular motion).



# KERALA COCONUT STEW



#### Concept:

This dish fuses the fragrant coconut milk-based Kerala stew (traditionally eaten with appam or idiyappam) with Italian fettuccine, creating a smooth, slurp able, mildly spiced pasta with South Indian warmth

#### Ingredients:

#### For Kerala Stew Base:

- Coconut oil 1.5 tbsp
- Cinnamon 1 small stick
- Cloves 3
- Cardamom 2 pods
- Ginger 1-inch, julienned
- Green chili 1, slit (adjust to taste)
- Onion 1 medium, sliced
- Carrot ½ cup, julienned
- Potato ½ cup, diced
- Green beans ½ cup, chopped
- Cooked chicken or mushrooms (optional) ½ cup

#### For Coconut Sauce:

Thick coconut milk – 200 ml
 Thin coconut milk – 150 ml

- Salt to taste
- Crushed black pepper ½ tsp
- Curry leaves a few

#### For Pasta:

- Fettuccine 200 g
- · Salt for boiling
- A dash of coconut oil or olive oil (for tossing)

#### **Preparation Steps:**

#### 1. Cook the Pasta:

- Boil fettuccine in salted water until al dente.
- Drain and toss lightly in oil to prevent sticking.

#### 2. Prepare the Kerala Stew Sauce:

- Heat coconut oil in a pan.
- Add cinnamon, cloves, cardamom. Sauté until fragrant.
- Add ginger, green chili, and sliced onions. Cook until translucent.
- Add the vegetables and sauté lightly.
- Pour in thin coconut milk. Cover and cook until vegetables are tender.
- Add cooked chicken or mushrooms now, if using.

#### RASGULLA TRES LECHES CAKE

A spongy East-meets-West dessert combining soft rasgullas with a creamy Mexican-style Tres leches soak and saffron cardamom Chantilly cream.

#### Concept:

Traditional rasgullas are soaked in a luxurious three-milk (Tres leches) mixture infused with Indian spices and topped with delicate whipped saffron cream — a multicultural masterpiece served chilled.

Serves: 6-8

Prep Time: 30 minutes (plus chilling)

#### Ingredients:

#### For Rasgulla (you can use store-bought for ease):

#### For Chenna (Paneer):

- Full-fat milk 1 litre
- Lemon juice or vinegar 2-3 tbsp (diluted with 2 tbsp water)

#### For Sugar Syrup:

- Sugar 1 cup
- Water 4 cups
- Cardamom pods 2 (optional)
- Rose water or kewra water ½ tsp (optional)

#### Instructions:

#### 1. Make Chenna For rasgulla (Curdled Milk):

- Boil the milk in a heavy-bottomed pan.
- Once it starts boiling, lower the flame and add diluted lemon juice gradually, stirring gently.
- When the milk curdles and separates (clear whey), turn off the heat.
- Pour the mixture into a muslin cloth or fine strainer and rinse under cold water to remove lemony taste.
- Squeeze out excess water and hang for 30–40 minutes to remove moisture (chenna should be moist, not dry).

#### 2. Knead the Chenna:

- Transfer the chenna to a plate and knead with your palm for 8-10 minutes until smooth and slightly greasy.
- Roll into small smooth balls (they will double in size while boiling).

#### 3. Prepare Sugar Syrup:

- In a wide, deep pan, boil water with sugar until fully dissolved.
- Add cardamom pods (optional) and bring to a rolling boil.

#### 4. Cook Rasgullas:

- Gently add chenna balls to the boiling syrup.
- Cover with a lid and cook on high flame for 12-15 minutes.
- The rasgullas will puff up and double in size.
- · Remove from heat and let them cool in the syrup.
- Add rose water or kewra water once cooled (optional).

#### For Tres Leches Mixture:



- Sweetened condensed milk ½ cup
- Evaporated milk 1/2 cup
- Full cream milk ½ cup
- Cardamom powder ¼ tsp
- A few saffron strands
- Rose water ½ tsp (optional)

#### For Sponge Cake Base (optional but recommended):

All-purpose flour - 3/4 cup

- Eggs 2
- Sugar ½ cup
- Baking powder ½ tsp
- Vanilla ½ tsp

#### For Saffron Cardamom Whipped Cream:

- Heavy cream 1 cup
- · Icing sugar 2 tbsp
- Saffron strands few (soaked in 1 tsp warm milk)
- Cardamom powder ¼ tsp





#### Preparation Steps:

#### 1. (Optional) Bake the Sponge Base:

- Whisk eggs and sugar until light and fluffy.
- Fold in sifted flour, baking powder, and vanilla.
- Pour into a greased baking dish and bake at 180°C for 20– 25 min.
- · Cool and prick with a fork.

#### 2. Prepare the Tres Leches Mixture:

- Warm the three milks slightly and add cardamom, saffron, and rose water.
- Pour over the sponge (or directly into serving cups if no sponge base is used).
- Allow the sponge to absorb it.

#### 3. Add Rasgullas:

- Squeeze syrup from rasgullas and place them on top of the soaked sponge or in milk mixture.
- Let them soak for 1-2 hours in the fridge.

#### 4. Make the Saffron Cardamom Cream:

 Whip chilled cream with sugar, saffron milk, and cardamom until soft peaks form.

#### 5. Assemble & Chill:

- Spread or pipe the saffron cream over the rasgullas.
- Garnish with rose petals, pistachios, or gold leaf.

#### **Plating Ideas:**

- · Serve in elegant dessert glasses or mini trifle bowls.
- · Top with crushed almond chikki or caramel shards for texture.
- Drizzle with reduced rasgulla syrup mixed with rose essence.

# Elaneer (Tender Coconut) Crème Brûlée with JAGGERY CARAMEL & COCONUT CRISP

A creamy French-style crème brûlée infused with the delicate flavour of Kerala elaneer (tender coconut), topped with jaggery caramel and crispy coconut chips.

Serves: 4

Prep & Chill Time: 30 min prep + 2 hrs chilling + torching time

#### Ingredients:

#### For Elaneer Crème Brûlée:

- Tender coconut water ½ cup
- Tender coconut flesh ½ cup (soft, scooped and finely chopped)
- Heavy cream 1 cup
- Full-fat milk ½ cup
- Egg yolks 4
- Sugar ¼ cup
- Vanilla extract ½ tsp
- Cardamom powder ¼ tsp (optional)

#### For Jaggery Caramel Topping:

- Powdered jaggery 2 tbsp
- Water 1 tbsp

#### For Coconut Crisp:

- Fresh grated coconut ¼ cup
- Sugar 1 tsp
- A pinch of salt
- Ghee 1 tsp



#### **Preparation Steps:**

#### 1. Make the Crème Brûlée Custard:

- Preheat oven to 150°C (300°F).
- In a saucepan, gently heat cream, milk, and sugar until warm (not boiling).
- In a bowl, whisk egg yolks gently (avoid froth).
- Temper yolks by slowly adding the warm milk mixture while whisking.
- Add vanilla, cardamom, tender coconut water, and chopped coconut flesh.
- Strain the custard (if needed for smoothness) and pour into ramekins.

#### Bake in Water Bath:

- Place ramekins in a tray and pour hot water around them to reach halfway up.
- Bake for 30-35 minutes until the center is just set.
- Cool, then refrigerate for 2-3 hours or overnight.

#### 2. Make the Jaggery Caramel (Instead of Sugar Crust):

- In a small pan, melt jaggery with water until bubbly and sticky.
- · Let cool slightly.
- Before serving, drizzle a thin layer over each custard (or brulée with a torch for smoky crisp effect if using dry jaggery powder).


